

application instructions

The instructions on these pages correspond to questions on the application form.

1. Classification

Choose *one* box from among Transfer or Postbaccalaureate.

2. Quarter & Year

All applicants must indicate which quarter they wish to begin enrollment at the UW. The UW's academic calendar for 2009-2010 is located at www.washington.edu/students/reg/calendar.

Reapplying

Think carefully before choosing which quarter, because *you cannot delay or defer your enrollment without reapplying*. You will have to reapply and pay another application fee if you file an application for one quarter and:

- you are accepted and do not enroll, or
- you are not accepted and wish to apply for a different quarter, or
- you submit an application and application fee but later decide not to complete your application file.

Summer (Degree Status) vs. Autumn

The admission standards for summer and autumn quarters are exactly the same; therefore, there is no advantage in the admission process in choosing summer. If you select summer, be aware that you must begin course work at that time. *Failure to enter summer cancels autumn admission and any registration.*

3. Major

You are encouraged to declare a major at this time. Most majors at the UW require that students complete some college course work before applying, and some require two full years of college work.

- If you are ready to declare a major, you must complete #3a and #3b. In the blanks provided, indicate both the name of the major and the major code, e.g., "Social Science" in #3a and "SOCSE" in #3b.

8. social security number

Two provisions of the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997, now part of the Internal Revenue Code, make it necessary for you to record your SSN in #8.

Section 25A provides for *Hope* and *Lifetime Learning Credits*, which allow persons enrolled in higher education classes to use part of their tuition payments as credits against their taxes. The information you provide on IRS Form W-95 will determine whether you, or the person who can claim you as a dependent, may take the *Hope Credit* or *Lifetime Learning Credit* to reduce Federal income tax.

Section 6050S requires educational institutions, including the UW, to file certain information with the IRS about each individual from whom it receives tuition. The UW's "return" must show for each student the correct SSN (or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number [ITIN] if the student is not eligible to obtain a SSN).

UW's Use of the SSN

At the UW, your SSN is used to match your admission test scores with your application and *to match your financial aid application with your admission application*. To avoid complications and a delay in financial aid notification, make sure your name and SSN are identical on the financial aid and admission applications.

SSNs are not used for student identification; you will be assigned a UW student number once admitted. Protecting the release of student information will be in accordance with all appropriate state and federal laws.

9. Date of birth

You must provide your date of birth for identification purposes.

10. legal name

Print or type your name clearly. To avoid confusion, use your full legal name whenever you contact the Office of Admissions.

11. former names

Use this space to indicate any former names you have used. It is very important that you complete this section if there is any possibility that Admissions would receive a transcript or other academic document under a different name from the one you are using now.

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12 13 address

Indicate the address to which the Office of Admissions should mail all correspondence. Notify Admissions *in writing* and preferably no more than two weeks beforehand if:

- your mailing address changes or
- you wish correspondence sent to your permanent address (provided in #13) rather than to the mailing address you originally specified in #12.

Applicants who provide a college mailing address: it is your responsibility to notify Admissions in writing when this address is no longer valid. Do not assume Admissions will automatically start sending mail to your permanent address when the academic term ends.

Leave #13 blank if your mailing address and permanent address are the same.

18 19 Permanent residency & Visa

These questions must be completed if you are not a U.S. citizen.

Please note that the UW Evening Degree Program does not charge nonresident tuition. Students pay the same tuition rate if they are resident, nonresident or international students.

20 Washington residency

Must be completed by all applicants claiming Washington residency. Indicate only the most *recent continuous* period of Washington residence.

In completing this question, answer for your parents or legal guardians if you are financially dependent; answer for yourself if you are independent. *Example:* answer “Yes” if you live in another state with your mother but your father has lived in Washington for the past five years. You are considered a dependent if a) you are under the age of 25 and b) you were or will be claimed as a dependent on your parents’ (or legal guardian’s) income tax return for the current and previous year. See page 15 for more information about policies governing Washington residency.

21 UW state employee

The University’s tuition exemption policy does not apply to these degree programs.

22 41 family information

The information requested in this section will be used to determine residence classification; it will also be used, along with your academic record, in making an admission decision. It is optional for applicants 25 years and older.

22C 32C Primary Parental Contact

Only one name can be entered in UW student records as the parental contact, so we are asking you to choose which parent or guardian the UW may contact with information about programs and policies that may be of interest. If you do not check either box, the name in #22b will automatically be entered as the parental contact. Regardless of how you answer this question, you still have the option in #31 and #41 to decide if this parent/guardian may have access to information in your admission file.

42 income and household size—optional

Your admission will *not* be adversely affected by reporting low family income.

The information requested in this section will be used along with your academic record in making an admission decision. In addition, aggregate (*not* individual) data collected in this section will be reported to the state of Washington.

Enter gross annual income for the most recent year completed and the year previous to that. Indicate in the boxes provided the years for which you are providing data.

If you or your parents filed an IRS tax return, gross annual income will be as recorded on IRS Form 1040—line 22, Form 1040A—line 18, or Form 1040EZ—line 4. If you or your parents did not file, record total income from: wages, salaries, and tips; business, rental, and farm income; alimony; interest income; dividends; capital gains; IRA distributions; pensions and annuities; Social Security benefits; and unemployment compensation.

Dependent or Independent?

Dependent students should complete #42a. Independent students should complete #42b.

You are considered a dependent in a particular year if you were or will be claimed as a dependent on your parents’ (or legal guardian’s) income tax return for that year.

If you were dependent one year and independent one year, complete the appropriate section for each year.

Dependent students: if your parents are separated or divorced, you should answer #42a about the parent who claimed you as a dependent on his or her income tax return. If the parent about whom you are answering #42a has remarried, you must also include information about your stepparent. If you have a legal guardian, complete #42a about your legal guardian.

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44 American Indian or Alaska Native—Optional

An American Indian or Alaska Native is a person who has origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment.

Verification of tribal affiliation, which is required, consists of one of the following:

- Official tribal identification. Examples: copy of a Tribal Enrollment card, treaty fishing card, corporation papers, or Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) document.
- Certificate of membership verification by the BIA, a tribal enrollment officer, or corporate official (in cases where a formal enrollment process does not exist).

48 Educational background—Schools and Colleges attended

Failure to disclose all schools, colleges, universities, and institutions of higher education you have attended may result in denial of admission to the University. Attach an additional page only if you use all the lines provided.

If you attended all or part of grades 1-8 outside the U.S., attach a separate sheet listing each school attended with the years of attendance and the grade levels; follow the format provided for #49.

Enrollment

Beginning with Grade 9

Begin the record of your educational background with the school where you attended grade 9. It may have been called a junior high school, high school, or some other name; regardless of its name, list it in #50 if you attended grade 9 there.

College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB) Codes

In the far left-hand column, record the CEEB code for all colleges and universities attended and, *if you know it*, for the last high school you attended. This is a four-digit code for colleges and universities and a six-digit code for high schools. Codes for many U.S. colleges and universities are provided below.

If this list does not include the college(s) you have attended, simply write the name and location of the school without the code.

49 50 Degrees awarded or expected

Indicate the full official name of the degree and the month and year when it was or will be conferred. For example, "AAS" can mean different things; the applicant should write out Associate of Arts and Sciences so that it is not mistaken for Associate of Applied Sciences. In a similar vein, the date of the degree should be as clear as possible. Simply writing "2003" is not as informative as "expected June 2003." Attach an additional page if necessary.

52 College Courses in Progress

The information you record in #52 could be crucial to your admission. Your answer here may be the only clue the Admissions Office has about your plans for completing core subject requirements before enrolling at the UW. In addition, the total number of college credits you are *projecting* (expecting to earn) could affect the admission decision.

Any courses that will be completed before your first quarter of enrollment at the UW should be listed, along with the term and year that they will be completed. *Do not list in #52* courses that have already been completed and that will appear on any transcripts submitted before the application closing date.

53 Personal statement

Complete instructions for #53 are on the web at www.evedegree.washington.edu/edp/admission/cr_statement.asp.

Format

Type or print your activities on 8.5" x 11" white paper, and use only one side of each sheet. Print your full name and the date at the top of each sheet.

54 signature

It is very important for all applicants to read this statement before signing the application. Your signature confirms that you have read, understood, and complied with the statement in #54.

filing an undergraduate application

general instructions

It is important that you read these instructions before completing the admission application form online at www.applyweb.com/apply/uwt. It is your responsibility as the applicant to be aware of all pertinent application requirements. If you have any questions, please call an evening degree adviser at 206-543-6160 or the Office of Admissions at 206-543-9686.

Financial Aid Applicants

If you plan to apply for financial aid, write your Social Security Number (SSN) on the application in #PI-2. The Financial Aid office cannot process your aid application unless the SSN on the admission application matches that provided on your financial aid application. The UW's Title IV code is 003798.

Students with Disabilities

To request disability accommodation in the application process, contact the Office of Admissions at 206-543-9686 (voice), 1-800-833-6388 (Washington State Relay Service TDD), or www.admit.washington.edu/contact/email (email).

Student Athletes

Students who expect to participate in intercollegiate athletics are required to submit the necessary information to the NCAA Eligibility Clearinghouse.

Q: CAN'T I JUST SEND YOU THE TRANSCRIPT FROM THE LAST COLLEGE I ATTENDED?

A: No, because of the different policies your previous college may have used when posting earlier transfer credit. Most colleges simply record the number of transfer credits accepted; and while a few provide a list of transferred courses, virtually none (UW included) post an entire digest of your prior academic career. The "admission GPA" used for your Admission Index is derived from all of your previous coursework, not just what you accomplished at your most recent college.

Q: IS ONE QUARTER EASIER THAN ANOTHER?

A: The admission standards for a given quarter depend on current enrollment at the UW, which in turn affects the University's ability to enroll new students. Applicants should not assume that it will be easier to gain entrance in Winter, Spring or Summer Quarters than in Autumn Quarter. The truth is, admission standards for specific quarters in the future cannot be predicted.

Q: WHEN WILL I FIND OUT IF I'VE BEEN ACCEPTED?

A: As a rule, please allow a minimum of four to six weeks' processing time from the date you file an application. If admissions standards for the quarter you request have not been set, you cannot receive a decision no matter how long Admissions has had your documents. In addition, applications requiring departmental review ordinarily take more time to process. Consult the chart on page 31 to see when the earliest offers of admission can be expected for a specific quarter.

Q: DOES THE ASSOCIATE DEGREE SATISFY ALL GENERAL UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS?

A: Not necessarily. Each college at the UW has its own general education requirements, which are more comprehensive than the relatively short list of University-wide general education requirements. The UW does not have general university requirements as do some other universities.

the personal statement

All applicants must write a personal statement and submit it with the application for admission.

The personal statement should be a comprehensive essay outlining significant aspects of your academic and personal history, particularly those that provide context for your academic achievements and educational choices. Quality of writing and depth of content both contribute toward a meaningful and relevant personal statement.

Address the following topics:

Academic elements (required)

Academic History

- Tell us about your college career to date, describing your performance, educational path and choices
- Explain any situations that may have had a significant positive or negative impact on your academic progress and/or curricular choices. If you transferred multiple times, had a significant break in your education, or changed career paths, explain.
- What are the specific reasons you wish to leave your most recent college/university and/or program of study?

Your Major and/or Career Goals

- Tell us about your intended major and career aspirations
- Are you prepared to enter your intended major at this time? If not, describe your plans for preparing for the major. What led you to choose this major? If you are still undecided, why? What type of career are you most likely to pursue after finishing your education?
- How will the UW help you attain your academic, career, and/or personal goals?

Personal elements (required)

Cultural Understanding

Thoughtfully describe the ways in which culture had an impact on your life and what you have learned about yourself and society as a result. How has your own cultural history enriched and/or challenged you?

Note: Culture may be defined broadly. Cultural understanding is often drawn from the ethnic background, customs, values, and ideas of a person's immediate family, community, and/or social environment in which they live.

Educational Challenges/Personal Hardships (if applicable)

Describe any personal or imposed challenges or hardships you have overcome in pursuing your education.

Examples: a serious illness, a disability, first generation in your family to attend college, significant financial hardship or responsibilities associated with balancing work, family and school.

Experiential Learning (if applicable)

Describe your involvement in research, community service, artistic endeavors, and work (paid or volunteer), and the ways in which it has contributed to your academic, career or personal goals.

Additional Comments (optional)

Do you have a compelling academic or personal need to attend the University of Washington-Seattle at this time? Is there anything else you would like us to know?

format

Content as well as form, spelling, grammar, punctuation, will be considered. Suggested length: 750 -1000 words.

- Online: Write your statement first in a word processing program (such as Word) or a text editor, and then copy and paste it into the text box provided. All line breaks remain. However, some formatting may be lost, such as bold, italics and underlines. This will not affect the evaluation of your application.
- PDF: Type or write your statement on 8.5 x 11" white paper. Double-space your lines, and use only one side of each sheet. Print your name, the words "Personal Statement," and the date at the top of each page, and attach the pages to your application.

TIPS FOR WRITING THE PERSONAL STATEMENT

Tell us who you are

We encourage you to share those aspects of your life that *are not apparent* from your transcripts. In providing the "backdrop" for your academic achievements and choices, describe your passions and commitments, your goals, a personal challenge faced, a hardship overcome, or the cultural awareness you've gained. Tell us *your* story. Be concise, but tell the whole story even if you need a little more space. You have our assurance that all of the information you provide in your application and statement will remain confidential.

Be specific

Personal Statements too often include sentences such as "I've always wanted to be a Husky" or "My whole family attended the UW." Though this may be important to you personally, such reasons are not particularly valuable to the Admissions staff. Why? Because they don't tell us anything distinctive about *your experiences and ultimate goals*.

Write like a college student

Your Personal Statement should reflect the experience and maturity of someone who has already attended college. It should reflect your understanding of the components of an undergraduate education, such as general education and the major. We want to read how your academic and personal experience to date, *in concrete, specific ways*, fits into your academic, career and personal goals.

application deadlines



EVENING DEGREE APPLICATION FILING DATES

This chart presents the important dates in the admissions process for UW Evening Degree Programs (the deadlines for the day program differ). The application closing dates are the dates by which all required materials must be postmarked in order to be assured of consideration.

An application file that is incomplete on the application closing date will not be considered further; the \$50 application fee cannot be returned or used for a future application.

In general, applications are given an initial review within six to eight weeks of receiving all required documents—longer during peak periods. Applicants seeking placement in majors with additional special selection criteria must apply in time to meet departmental deadlines and follow any additional departmental application procedures. Allow sufficient time for processing—at least four weeks prior to department deadlines.
